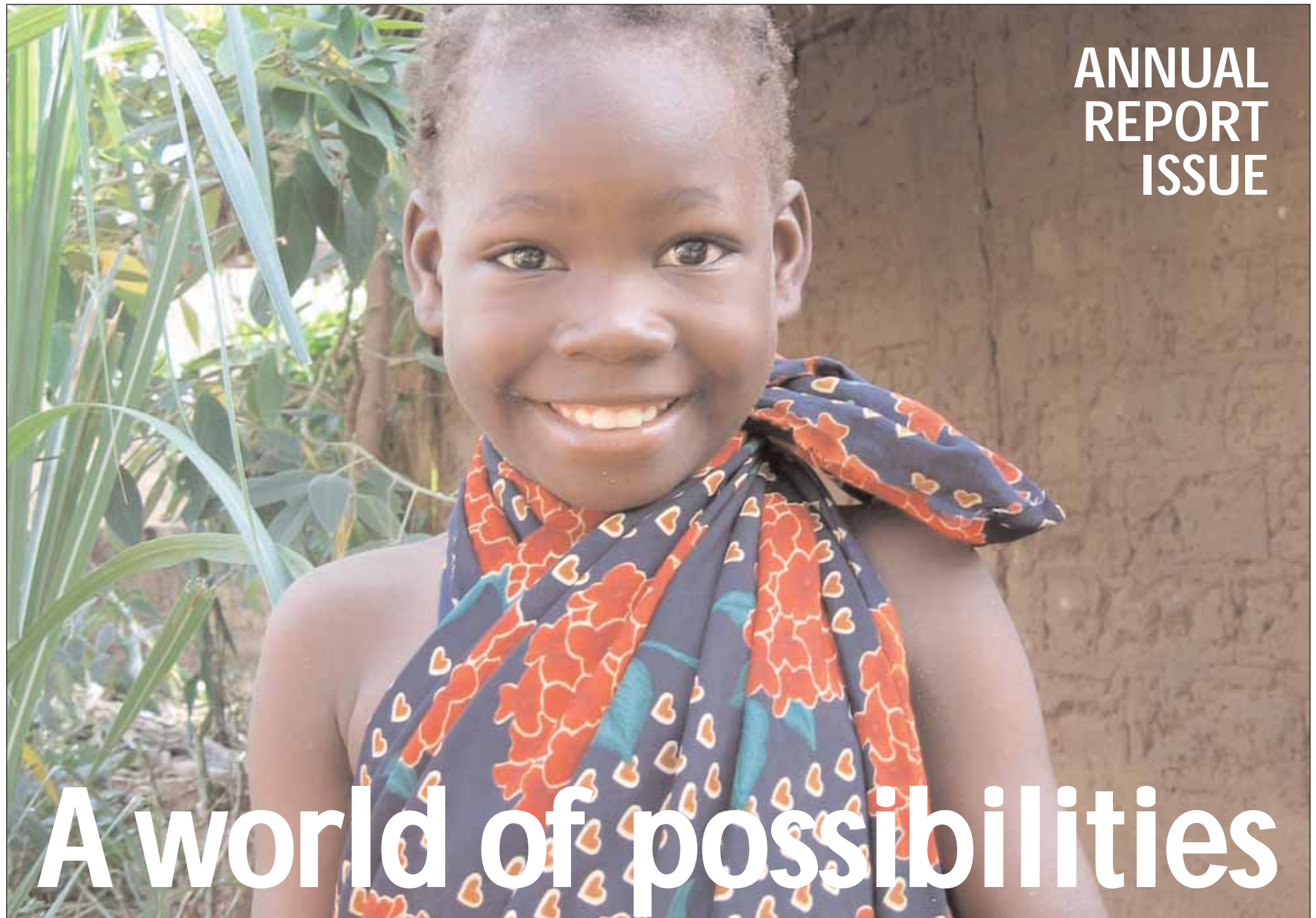

We are celebrating the 50th anniversary of PWRDF under the theme – "In Faith, Join Hands, Inspire Hope". Across the country exciting events are happening with

the 50 Café Events, the 50 Refugee Families Sponsorship Program and the 50 Leaders Program. We are participating in the Vision 2019 initiative of the General Synod and in the formation of an international Anglican Alliance for Global Relief and Development. And we are well into a branding exercise – looking at new and imaginative ways to tell the story of our walk with partners. We could be moving into the next era of our work in the world under a new name!

So much is in bud and we are looking ahead with hope! With gratitude for your prayers and partnership.

Highlights of the 50th Anniversary Program

This has been a pivotal time for PWRDF as we celebrate the past 50 years and prepare for the future.

PWRDF's 50th Anniversary Program was launched in October 2008 with a service in Springhill, NS, to commemorate the Springhill mine disaster of October 23, 1958. Out of that tragic event, The Primate's World Relief Fund, (later re-named The Primate's World Relief and Development Fund), was created in 1959.

The activities and programs recognizing this special time have been planned to support a CAFÉ theme of Celebration, Awareness, Fundraising and Education. Parishes and dioceses across the country organized special services, dinners, silent auctions, art and fair trade coffee sales, speakers' series and more. Numerous 50th anniversary resources are also available including a CAFÉ website (www.pwrdf50.org) where stories can be shared and resources downloaded. In addition, PWRDF launched several new programs:

The 50 Refugee Families Sponsorship Program

As of June 2009, 17 sponsorships were confirmed, bringing a total of 53 people to Canada from Colombia, Burma, the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), Eritrea and Palestinians from Iraq. Matching funds of up to \$100,000 came from Citizenship and Immigration Canada to further support parishes entering into sponsorship agreements.

The 50 Leaders Program

Launched in May 2009, this program will identify and accompany a diverse group of 50 Anglicans in Canada between the ages of 16-

30 years. Through partner visits and cross-cultural learning opportunities, these young Anglicans will deepen their faith and understanding of development, relief, refugees and global justice issues.

Hymn Contest

Lyrics written by Anglicans across Canada will be sung to the tune ARFON. The winning hymn will be used by parishes on PWRDF Sundays and at PWRDF events.

Public engagement

The Public Engagement team supports the PWRDF network of diocesan and parish representatives across Canada and hosts regional meetings in the four ecclesiastical provinces. In turn, the reps act as ambassadors at meetings, synods and events. In 2008, partners from Mexico, Bangladesh, South Africa and Nova Scotia shared the transformative work taking place in their communities. Delegates heard about language and cultural recovery work by the Mainland Confederacy of Mi'kmaq; seed preservation and agricultural reform in Bangladesh; human rights education in Mexico; and HIV and AIDS education and health care in South Africa. Volunteers learned about PWRDF's work during visits to partners in Kenya, Burundi, Cuba and Bangladesh in 2009.

Youth network

In February 2009, a youth delegation traveled to the east African country of Burundi to forge a relationship with youth in the Diocese of Bujumbura. Members of the PWRDF Youth Council also attended the World Student Christian Federation Assembly in Montreal. justgeneration.ca, PWRDF's website for Anglican youth, continues to provide an online destination for young people eager to share ideas and stories about justice issues and how to make the world a better place.

The Canadian Foodgrains Bank (CFGB) & KAIROS

We marked the first anniversary of our membership in the Canadian Foodgrains Bank (CFGB) while another partner, KAIROS (Canadian Ecumenical Justice Initiatives), mobilized Anglicans across Canada to turn off their lights during Earth Hour.

There are more than 42 million people forcibly displaced by conflict: 16 million refugees and asylum seekers who fled their countries most of whom ended up in overcrowded and dangerous refugee camps in neighbouring countries; and 26 million "internally displaced persons" (IDPs) trapped inside their country of origin.

PWRDF partners in Kenya, Egypt, Gaza, Sri Lanka and India provide health care, nutrition, education, legal aid, advocacy and skills training for refugees and IDPs. In addition, PWRDF supports humanitarian relief aid to hundreds of thousands of refugees and internally displaced populations in many other parts of the world and also works with the Canadian Council for Refugees (CCR) and with KAIROS (Canadian Ecumenical Justice Initiatives) to create policy that will protect the rights of refugees and migrant workers.

Emergency relief & rehabilitation

PWRDF's Humanitarian Response work is carried out through Action by Churches Together (ACT) as well as through ecumenical collaboration with the Canadian Foodgrains Bank (CFGB) and Canadian Churches in Action (CCA). Our priority is emergency appeals in the Global South, particularly "forgotten" emergencies.

The PWRDF refugee ministry has both a national and an international component. Internationally, we work with the Global Ecumenical Network on Uprooted People, a World Council of Churches network that strategizes on advocacy issues for fair and just international refugee and migration laws, policies,

regulations and practices. We support the ministry of partners in Kenya, Egypt, Palestine, India and Sri Lanka to help refugees, migrants and internally displaced people. In addition, we respond with emergency relief grants to meet the urgent humanitarian needs of uprooted populations throughout the world.

In 2008-2009, PWRDF responded to several natural disasters as well as emergencies caused by conflict, including: Cyclone Nargis; the food crisis in Ethiopia; conflict and displacement in the Democratic Republic of Congo; the genocide in Darfur; hurricanes in Cuba and Haiti; the Sichuan earthquake in China; the Bihar flood in India; and conflict in Gaza.

PWRDF in the world - regional reports

Asia-Pacific

The DARE Network Teens for Kids Program

PWRDF has supported the Drug and Alcohol Recovery and Education Network (DARE) since 2005 providing funding that is focused on the real needs of the people it serves. Young people who have lived most or all of their lives in the Thai-Burma border refugee camps are at high risk because of the lack of educational opportunities, boredom, the frustration of confinement and peer pressure. Substance abuse is a growing problem. Within the general population of the camps, solvent and drug abuse are concerns especially for teenagers and children. DARE has worked in the refugee camps for the last 8 years as the sole provider of addiction services to the refugee population addressing the core essentials of mind, body and spirit. Activities are targeted to appeal directly to young people who in turn share what they learn with the children who look up to them.



UBINIG, Policy Research for Development Alternative in Bangladesh, is working on their new agriculture movement, Naya Krishi Andolon to enable farmers to reach their goals of a healthy ecosystem and a healthy way of life. The underlying principle is the practice of biodiversity based farming that ensures seasonal crop variety and complements the diet of beef, poultry and fish. This farming method maintains a healthy balance in the eco-system, in the community diet and guarantees pure, sustainable food production. They are also working towards building seed huts where communities preserve their own seeds and have free access to them especially in times of emergency. Farmers are required to replenish the stock after the harvest to ensure sustainability. Under the current PWRDF-CIDA health sector program, UBINIG plans to facilitate the building of 15 seed huts in 15 communities by the year 2011. PHOTO: COURTESY OF UBINIG

Canada

The Indigenous Peoples Development Program is built on core principles of trust, mutual respect and Indigenous participation in decision-making. The program follows the lead of our 12 Indigenous partners to support project initiatives that build stronger, healthier and more self-reliant communities.

Together, we mobilize human, material, socio-cultural and financial resources to promote woman and youth empowerment; networking and inter-Indigenous partnerships; and programs that preserve and revitalize languages and cultures. Some examples include:

The Nuu-chah-nulth Economic Development Corporation (NEDC)

The Nuu-chah-nulth (NCN) face the possibility of losing their language, something that would have a devastating impact on the preservation of culture. Since 1998, PWRDF has been working with the Nuu-chah-nulth Tribal Council to support initiatives of the Nuu-chah-nulth Language and Culture Program of NEDC.

Kanien'kehaka Onkwawén:na Raotitiohkwa (KOR)

Kanien'kehaka Onkwawén:na Raotitiohkwa (KOR) is a cultural and language education centre located in the Kanien'kehaka (Mohawk) Territory of Kahnawake, near Montreal. Kahnawake's population consists of approximately 8,000 Mohawk citizens.

KOR, established in 1978, provides workshops, presentations and seminars that focus on Mohawk language, history, culture and traditions. The five-year partnership with PWRDF has enabled KOR to strengthen its language and cultural projects.

First Nations Adult and Higher Education Consortium (FNAHEC)

Since 2000, PWRDF has collaborated with FNAHEC to implement language and cultural programs. They are piloting a First Nations studies course online in the fall of 2009.

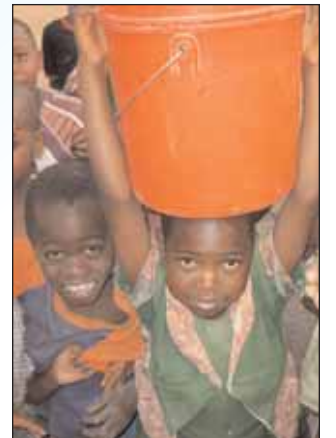

Africa

PWRDF supports partners in seven African countries who work to reduce poverty and meet basic needs by improving access to potable water and sanitation, food and health care, including prevention and treatment of HIV and AIDS. In addition, PWRDF works in partnership to deliver public education on human rights, including monitoring, good governance and peace building.

In Hamburg, South Africa, the **Keiskamma Trust** focuses primarily on health care, with an emphasis on education, prevention and treatment of HIV and AIDS and TB. Assisted by Dr. Carol Hofmeyr, the Trust began by delivering anti-retroviral therapy for people with HIV and has since expanded to include a number of other community programs. Through the **Keiskamma Health Program**, health workers in 33 villages have been trained to educate people living with AIDS about treatment and prevention of mother to child transmission of disease. In the **Keiskamma Art Project**, HIV-positive women embroider pillows, bags, and other art pieces, including altarpieces, for sale in a Hamburg shop. In 2008, the group increased its sales commissions by 25%. There is also an organic garden program, which helps people with HIV and AIDS improve their diet by growing fruit and vegetables. An education program supports three centres that provide art and music education as well as after-school remedial help for school-age children. PHOTO: GLEN SPURRELL



Latin America-Caribbean

PWRDF works with a variety of partners in seven countries as well as at the regional level. We understand that the Latin America-Caribbean program must be human centred and include the Indigenous concept of the earth and all its inhabitants "living well" (*buen vivir*).

Our programs offer support and accompaniment to civil society organizations, both church-based and secular, to build individual and group capacity for effective social, economic and political development.

Strong emphasis has been placed on working with women and their communities to address issues of human rights, maternal health, HIV and AIDS, food sustainability and income generation. PWRDF also supports capacity-building for community-based organizations.

In addition to country-based work, regional initiatives support Indigenous women and promote economic, social and cultural rights. In-Canada advocacy work focuses on human rights, aid, trade and Canada's role in the hemisphere.

Losing her home; finding her life's purpose

When you are a poor, single mother, and not only the rug but your entire house has been pulled out from under you in a violent eviction, where do you turn to for help? Nine years ago, when she was unable to pay her rent, Monserrat González found herself, her two children and her elderly mother on the streets of Chihuahua, Mexico. With the help of the Women's Human Rights Centre, a PWRDF partner, Monserrat won back her home, and her sense of dignity and self-worth.

The Centre is dedicated to empowering women to be defenders of their own rights through education, advocacy for gender-based legislation and public policy, and legal and psychological support to victims of violence and gender-based discrimination. The Centre is also carrying out important research and legal work on the "femicides" (systematic killing of women) that have taken place in the state of Chihuahua over the past 15 years.

Monserrat's story is testimony to this transformative development. When PWRDF met her in 2007 she was studying law so that she could help other women facing similar situations. In finding the Centre, Monserrat explained, "I lost my home, but then won the lottery!" PHOTO: ERICK COLL GONZÁLEZ

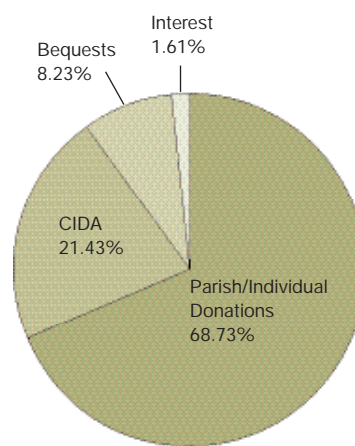

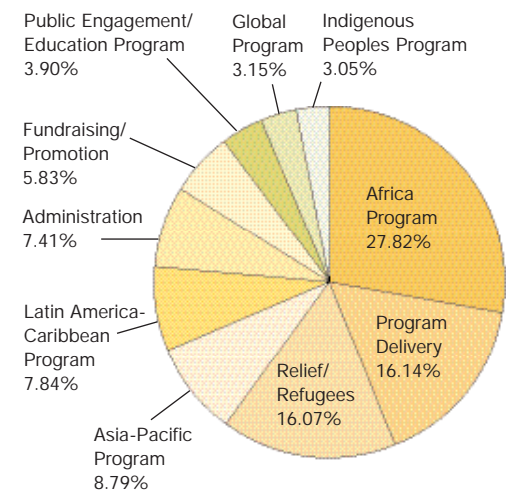
